Operation Eyesight's Community Eye Health Program model sets

us apart from other organizations fighting avoidable blindness –

because we focus on more than just eye health. While restoring sight

and preventing blindness is at the heart of our mission, we can't simply treat "eye patients" and ignore other health problems.

Targeting eye health alone isn't enough to eliminate avoidable blindness; if other health care needs aren't met, there will still be people suffering from vision problems or other conditions. For example, vitamin A deficiency results in preventable childhood blindness, and increases the risk of death from common childhood illnesses such as diarrhea.



One of the root causes of avoidable blindness is vitamin A deficiency. Here, a nurse gives a child a vitamin A supplement to help prevent blindness and promote general health.

With your help, we're enabling poor communities to lead healthier and more productive lives. Not only do we educate target communities about eye health, but we also address their essential health care needs. Our trained community health workers educate communities about eye health and general health (such as the importance of vitamin A) and create awareness of the eye care services available in or around the community. They also collaborate with health care staff to deliver services such as immunizations.

We're always proud to report the number of sight-restoring cataract surgeries performed or prescription eyeglasses dispensed, but the pinnacle of our work is the healthy communities that are empowered to lead happy and productive lives. For example, we've declared over 1,000 villages as avoidable blindness-free. In these villages, mortality rates have dropped significantly and school enrollment rates have increased.

Community Eye Health


Our goal was to declare 1,000 villages **avoidable blindness-free** by the end of 2018, and we surpassed it! By the end of December, the count was 1,010 villages. We are well on our way toward achieving our goal of 2,020 avoidable blindness-free villages by the end of 2020!

Hospital Improvement

This year, we continued to strengthen the facilities and capacities of our partner hospitals to ensure they will be able to provide quality eye health care to more people. The initial step to achieving this is through quality audits.

For All The World To See

We conducted 12 comprehensive audits in Ghana, Zambia and India to evaluate our partners' capacity to meet the needs of the surrounding communities, including physical facilities and personnel, and to make recommendations for improvements that should be made.





Disease Control

One highlight this year was the launch of a **Community-Based Diabetic Retinopathy project** in India. The World Health Organization reports that almost 35 percent of diabetics suffer from some level of retinopathy, damage to the retina which may cause visual impairment. Bringing awareness about this condition and care for those who suffer from it is an important first step to keeping diabetic retinopathyrelated blindness from increasing in the countries where we work.

Eye disease is often spread by poor hygiene and a lack of sanitation within communities. In 2018, we

drilled or rehabilitated 31 boreholes in Zambia, providing communities with safe water for washing hands and faces to stop the spread of blinding trachoma. We also implemented a training program that empowers pump minders to maintain and repair the boreholes in their communities.



Vineela's day at the office begins at 9:30 a.m. She starts by going through her weekly plans, preparing her to-do list and tackling her most urgent tasks. These often include following up on the progress of our partner hospitals and coordinating training for vision technicians, optometrists and ophthalmic assistants. Lunch is at 1 p.m., after which she's busy with project and training reports. She wraps up at 5:30 p.m. with a final report to her manager and discussion about tomorrow's important tasks.

But that's not all. With her expertise in clinical optometry, Vineela trains optometrists, technicians and final-year optometry students, visiting one or two of our partner hospitals every month.

During these trips, she also monitors our Hospital-Based Community Eye Health Projects. She visits vision centres, talks with the staff and patients, checks patient records and addresses any areas for improvement. "I get to see the changes we bring into people's lives. That's what I like about my job the most!" says Vineela.

"My interests are in clinics and teaching," she continues.
"Operation Eyesight's unique approach in reaching the underprivileged motivated me to apply for this position.
Now I am very happy to be a part of this family and to serve the neediest!"

What YOU achieved at Kitale District Hospital

Bernard is a great example of the transformation our donors have made at Kitale District Hospital. Bernard, from Kenya's Trans Nzoia County, spent three years unable to see, dependent on others for everything. Now, after receiving sight-restoring surgery, he's one of the hospital's most dedicated community health volunteers! He's committed to helping others receive the same gift of sight that changed his life.

Before Operation Eyesight started working in Trans Nzoia County, the hospital's eye unit was just one small room with a staff of two. Twice a year, a surgeon would travel 74 kilometres from another hospital for patients in need of more specialized treatment. Since services were limited, many people were left to struggle with visual impairment.

In September 2010, an upgraded eye unit funded by Operation Eyesight's donors was opened at the hospital. **You can see for yourself the dramatic changes!** Additionally, hospital staff and other Operation Eyesight partners have screened all 168,730 primary school children in Trans Nzoia County for eye problems.

Because of our amazing donors, the people of the county now have quality eye health care that's available to everyone. Thank you for making this possible!
